REL 224-01: Yoga: Theory and Practice

This course analyzes video gaming and esports cultures and values, as well as how they interact with society in general. This course teaches students the history, methodology, and theoretical approaches to videogaming and esports from various fields and disciplines.

REL 249-01: Religion and Public Heath

This course will explore the history of schismatic religious groups, anti-cult hysteria, and controlling religious authority in American history by focusing on Jonestown, Waco, and NXIVM. This course asks who gets to call a religion a cult, and whether the term is a useful category for cultural analysis.

REL 368-01: Gender in Hindu Traditions

This interdisciplinary course is centered around two primary questions: 1) How have Hindu traditions diversely evaluated and conceived of the human body, particularly as a sexed and gendered entity; and 2) How have these evaluations and conceptions shaped both normative Hindu masculinity and femininity, as well as the ways in which Hindu individuals have (sometimes subversively) performed and conceptualized embodied and gendered existence? To answer these questions, we will explore a collection of Hindu practices, cultures and philosophies from a range of historical periods and geographic contexts.

REL 371-01: Islamic Mysticism

Mystics try to connect with God during their lifetimes -- they don't want to wait until they die and go to Heaven! Many of the world's religions feature mystical strains, and Islam is no different. Sufism, or Islamic mysticism, is one of the most influential elements of Islamic piety. Sufis produced some of the greatest literature and music in the Islamic world; they also contributed to Islam's political and theological thought and drove much of its expansion. In this course, we will begin by examining the historical formation of Sufism as a movement of asceticism in the early years of Islam. We will then consider Islamic mysticism's medieval expression in its brotherhoods, devotional practices, theological writings, and musical and literary output. Finally, we will examine Sufism in a modern and post-modern context. Readings that include both primary and secondary sources will allow students to engage with Sufism as both a socio-cultural and a religious phenomenon. We will also try out some experiential exercises, like meditating and doing calligraphy. You do not need a background in Islamic Studies to take this course -- all are welcome!
